6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Tezpur College follows the curriculum developed by Gauhati University for its affiliated colleges.

- Besides regular classes various departments also organise seminars, quiz, etc. to enhance the teaching-learning process in the college.
- Parent-teacher interactive sessions are organised and guest teacher/experts are invited.
- Inter departmental and inter disciplinary classes are held in the different department for the benefit of the major students.
- Field trips and excursion are organised as a part of teaching-learning process.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

College follows the Gauhati University schedule for the Term End Semester examinations. Besides, the college holds sessional examinations along with presentation made by students. The scripts of the end semester examinations are evaluated by Gauhati University in the various micro zones set up by it through spot evaluation process. The scripts of the sessional examinations and internal assessment are evaluated internally by the college. Home assignments and regular class tests are also held

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college has one Research Promotion Cell which encourages the young teachers and students to take up research projects. The cell has also taken steps to publish a book comprising the project reports of the 5th semester students.

- Nine no. of faculty members are pursuing Ph. D. at present.
- Two teachers have been awarded Ph. D. degree in this year.
- Dr. Basanta Kalita from Economics department is appointed as Ph. D. supervisor by Gauhati University.
- Department of Geography has been involved in many research activities regarding Tezpur town in the fields of solid waste management, transport modelling, water shade area management, urban land use modelling and tourism development.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Completed the construction of a new classroom building with financial assistance from RUSA.
- More books are purchased in the college library as well as in departmental libraries.
- Foundation is being laid of the new RCC building to be constructed with the financial assistance from RUSA.
- The construction of new Cycle stand cum canteen building is going on.
- Construction of few classrooms adjoining the Buniyad Building is going on.
- One new Xerox machine is purchased and being used at the Office of the Principal.
- Few LCD projectors are also provided to the departments along with voice amplifiers.
- Geography department has two GIS software.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Teachers take part in seminars and workshops in their respective fields to enhance knowledge.
- Faculty members have participated in Orientation programmes, Refresher courses and short term courses in different universities.
- Non-teaching staff are sent to join the training courses to sharpen their skills.
- Faculty members are engaged in conducting academic and other activities in the college.
- Members from the teaching staff are also appointed as member/convener in different academic and administrative committees.

- Innovative and new mode of teachings through audio-video facilities is introduced. Many class rooms are equipped with overhead LCD projectors along with voice amplifier. This will help to enhance students' interest towards class room teachings.
- The college has introduced NCC for Boys' that will bring sense belongingness to the college among the students.
- The class routine for the new session is given to the students at the time of admission so that regular classes can be held immediately once the college opens for the session.

- Sri Mandeep Das is appointed as the Career Counsellor of the college so that a continuous and systematic counselling system can be established in the institution.
- Dr. Achyut Hazarika is appointed as the Medical Officer to look after the health issue of the students. Regular health check up camp is organised for the students in the campus.

Analysis of the feedback

Feedbacks from students, teachers and guardians are collected annually on various academic and non-academic matters by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college. IQAC collects information on different matters like performance of the teacher on various counts like punctuality, domain knowledge, availability in the institution, capacity to explain, etc on a 10 point scale. Similarly, views from the guardians are also collected through questionnaire on issues regarding the availability of facilities, infrastructure, counselling, etc. The teachers are also encouraged to air their views on the affairs of the college. After the data is collected, a committee of teachers is formed to analyse the feedback and to suggest some recommendations based on the analysis.
